Lynchburg Students Support Special Olympics

On September 10th, Lynchburg College's DPT (LC DPT) program teamed up with Special Olympics Virginia to host the third annual Young Athletes Autumn Classic. The event targeted children ages 3-11 of all ability levels. The Young Athletes Autumn Classic featured an exciting day of sporting events, including basketball, volleyball, track, and bocce ball. With the help of numerous faculty and student volunteers, children and families had a fun-filled day that promoted respect, unity, and inclusion.

Around 40 kids attended the event, which showcases various sports that Special Olympics offers its athletes throughout the year. The Young Athletes Autumn Classic kicks off the year for Special Olympics participants who are 2-7 years old. In addition to this event, Special Olympics Young Athletes have the chance to compete in two Little Feet track and field meets. The goal of the Young Athletes program is to get children involved with sports at an early age and focus on basics that will improve motor skills, hand-eye coordination, and cognitive development.

As part of the Student Professional Involvement coursework, LC DPT student volunteers support Special Olympics Virginia athletic activities such as bowling, basketball, and track throughout the year. By helping athletes learn skills and by cheering the athletes on in their participation, the DPT students are proud to provide support to the Special Olympics Virginia community.

Marymount University Hosts Build and Grow with Go Baby Go

On September 17th over 150 community volunteers joined the Marymount University physical therapy program to build 12 motorized cars for children with disabilities. The PT program has been building cars through the Go Baby Go program for 2 years but wanted to expand. The launch event was a combined effort between the PT program and Good Beginnings, a long -time clinical partner of Marymount. The event drew media attention and raised \$15,000 from

community donors to fund the cars and building materials. Dr. Cole Galloway, founder of Go Baby Go, was in attendance and delivered opening remarks that inspired all of the attendees "this isn't just about building cars, we are here to learn from each other and to grow as a community to promote social justice". The PT students and faculty worked side by side with local volunteers to build the cars and then create modifications specific for each child's needs. The build was quickly overshadowed by the road rally, where all 12 children were able to successfully independently control their cars.

I am both excited about and honored to be a part of Go Baby Go at Marymount University. Everyone that was part of making this day great has an amazing heart and empathy for the human experience. I was very fortunate to be able to work with a young boy and his family on modifications for his new red Jeep. When we first met, I asked his father about his son's personality, communication skills, and activity levels to get a better sense of what we could do to help him enjoy this new mode of interaction and transportation. He told me that his son is not normally very expressive and is not mobile due to his condition. It was such a great experience to see this little man light up when I talked to him about how we could decorate his car and when we had him choosing materials to use for his seating. But nothing compared to the smile on his face when he got in the car and was able to push the hand-operated gas petal to speed down the halls; I don't think he stopped smiling for the rest of the day, he was so happy. His parents and little sister were so happy and thankful for the hard work and extra hours our team put in to make such a positive impact on their son's life. This is not an experience that will fade with time. The impact of this event on the 12 children, their families and friends, as well as all of the organizers and volunteers will transcend the MU DPT department walls and catch fire, that much is for certain. More builds will come, more lives will be changed, and more life will be lived thanks to Go Baby Go.

2017 Physician Fee Schedule Proposed Final Rule - The Good, The Bad and The Ugly

Each year in this edition of The Virginian, I seem to summarize basically the same grouping of information regarding the proposed Medicare Physician Fee Schedule. This year, there are a few new topics added to the mix.

On July 7, Medicare released the proposed physician fee schedule for calendar year 2017. In this document, CMS details changes in payment and in billing that will impact all practicing physical therapists.

First and foremost, the adjustment factor for 2017 will be .5%. This amount was determined through an objective process which is further described here. Overall not a significant boost across the existing fee schedule but not a drastic cut either.

Within the proposal, there is also a modification in the billing process for physical therapy evaluations and re-evaluations. Since 2010, the APTA has worked diligently to reform the current payment system for outpatient physical therapy. In response to these efforts, in 2017 AMA CPT codes 97001 (Physical Therapy Evaluation) and 97002 (Physical Therapy Re=evaluation) will be deleted. The physical therapy evaluation code will be replaced by three codes each representing a defined level of increasing exam

complexity; the re-evaluation code will be replaced as well with one code. While CMS supported the APTA's suggestions to expand evaluation code descriptions they did not support assigning higher values to accompany the codes representing greater clinical time and depth. While disappointing, we can be certain this is not the end of the conversation with CMS.

Select physical therapy codes were reviewed by CMS to potentially be considered services billable as telehealth. Unfortunately, at this point, CMS does not consider physical therapists as providers of telehealth services.

10 codes used by physical therapists were identified as misvalued codes and will be adjusted to better represent the service value. The APTA is involved in offering information in this process.

Lastly, the proposal addresses stricter rules on physician self-referral scenarios. Definitely a step in the right direction.

This high level summary in no way includes all of the elements of the proposed final rule, but it does highlight the issues most important to physical therapy practice. If you would like to see more details, simply go to the APTA website.

The VPTAPAC is extremely grateful for the continued ongoing support from its membership over the past several years. Through our fundraising efforts, we have realized substantial contributions that provided the VPTAPAC and the Legislative Committee the resources to meet their goals on an annual basis. These contributions have been used to support legislators on both sides of the isle in the General Assembly. The financial support we give to our legislators allows our voices to be heard and gives us a "seat at the table" when policies affecting the practice of physical therapy and health care in general are being debated and created.

We are entering another General Assembly election year. As reported by our lobbyist, nearly half of the General Assembly has turned over during the past three elections cycles. This turn over places an ever-increasing challenge to our profession in terms of engaging the awareness of these new legislators to health care issues impacting both the profession of physical therapy and the patients/clients we serve. In order to continue the momentum we have established over the past few years and to remain a respected and relevant supporter of the legislators on both sides of the isle, we need to continue to provide the financial backing to the VPTAPAC.

Here are some of the accomplishments related to physical therapy over the past few election cycles:

- Increased direct access to physical therapy; reducing the regulatory burden and certification requirements;
- Improve term protection and the prohibition on advertising physical therapy services when not performed by a Physical Therapist,
- Participate in developing of "Return to Play" concussion guidelines for scholastic sports;
- Protect our scope of practice on issues such as dry needling and spinal manipulation; and,
- Protection of payment for PT services within the worker's compensation system.

We would like to thank our members, Legislative Committee and our lobbyist, Richard Grossman, for assisting us with our endeavors.

Northern District Update



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2016 CONFERENCE COURSE DESCRIPTIONS



Is it ever "JUST" a Concussion? Cristin Beazley, PT, DPT, CBIS Friday, October 7, 2016 7.5 contact hours

This course is designed to enhance the participant's knowledge and skill set with implementing evidence-based, comprehensive management for individuals with a concussion. It will include a myriad of didactic based information on the pathophysiology, common impairments, and interventions used with this population. The role of the Physical Therapist in management of this diagnosis will be the primary focus, with inclusion of information on the role of interdisciplinary care. Participants will have the opportunity to practice assessments and interventions during this course with guidance from the instructor.

Physical Therapists (PTs) are uniquely qualified to help manage and treat this population. Concussion therapy is primarily focused on neurological impairments, with heavy emphasis on the vestibular system and cervical intervention. Patients should be treated as having a neurologic injury; however, in a large portion of cases, it is also a sports medicine injury. Physical Therapists are in both areas, and properly trained and experienced therapists can blend them both seamlessly. Physical Therapists specialize in the rehabilitation process and are effective in managing the scope of symptoms and concerns as they relate to recovery.

Evidence-Based Approach to Shoulder Injuries in the Overhead and Contact Athlete Brian J. Eckenrode, PT, DPT, OCS Friday, October 7, 2016 3.75 contact hours

Shoulder injuries, a common occurrence in athletics, present with unique rehabilitation considerations depending on sport type, injury mechanism, and conservative versus operative management. Clinicians should have a sound understanding of the current best practice treatment approach for these injuries. Evidence-based interventions for shoulder injuries in the athlete will be discussed with considerations including the kinetic chain and return to play criteria.

Introduction to Pediatric Vestibular Rehabilitation Rose Marie Rine, P.T., Ph.D. Friday-Saturday, October 7-8, 206 15 contact hours \$100 Lab Fee Limited to 20 participants

This 2-day course provides an overview of evidence based practice for vestibular related impairments in children, and is appropriate for physical & occupational therapists and assistants working in pediatrics. The didactic content includes: 1) detailed review of the anatomy, physiology and development of the vestibular system, 2) the epidemiology of vestibular dysfunction in children, 3) diagnostic and clinical testing of vestibular function, and 4) examination and evaluation of vestibular related impairments, and 5) intervention for vestibular related impairments in children. Hands-on demonstration and training of evaluation and intervention are included. Case reviews and discussion are used to facilitate application of the material. Handouts are provided online, several on site. Reviewed and approved by the Federation of State Boards of Physical Therapy (FSBPT).

Migraine: It's so much more than a Headache Diane M. Wrisley, PT, PhD, NCS Matthew R. Ammons PT, DPT, CIMT Saturday, October 8, 2016 6.5 contact hours

This course will provide the student with the pathophysiology, diagnostic criteria and differential diagnosis of migraine. Examination and treatment techniques will be introduced and practiced in laboratory sessions. Medical and physical therapy management will be discussed as well as alternative interventions. Material learned will be applied to representative patient cases in a small group activity. Applications will be provided for the neurological and orthopedic physical therapist.

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Managing the Injured Runner Diane M. Wrisley, PT, PhD, NCS Jason Soncrant, DPT, SCS, CSCS, FAAOMPT Saturday-Sunday, October 8-9, 2016 10.5 contact hours

This lab-based course is a day and a half. The focus will be on comprehensive examination and evidence based treatment of the lower quarter with an emphasis on the injured runner. Participants should wear comfortable clothing and footwear for examination and exercise labs. Participants should bring a yoga mat or beach towel, and a mobilization belt. Please download the Hudl Technique app, Couch to 5K free app and a metronome app on a mobile device.

Providing ICU Early Mobility to Improve Outcomes for Critically Ill Patients Heidi Engel, PT, DPT Saturday-Sunday, October 8-9, 2016 10.5 contact hours

This Course provides an introduction and overview to the topic of early mobility in the ICU, addressing these questions in this order: What defines early mobility? What harms are patients in the ICU vulnerable to sustaining? Why is early mobility an essential component of critical care medicine as practiced today? Who is responsible for providing this care? And how do we provide this service to medically complex patients effectively? Once these concepts are presented and reviewed, case studies and discussion of inter professional collaborative care as a means to succeed and sustain an early mobility program will be presented.

Neural Dynamics: Application and differential diagnosis for common clinical presentations

Sue E. Curfman, PT, DHSc, OCS Jason Grandeo PT, DPT, OCS, FAAOMPT Friday, October 7, 2016 3.75 contact hours

Our understanding of how the peripheral nervous system moves is increasing but is our ability to differentially diagnose neurodynamic dysfunctions improving? This course will provide an overview of the anatomy and kinesiology of the peripheral nervous system and relevant musculoskeletal structures. Examination, evaluation and intervention of neurodynamics will be presented. Commonly misdiagnosed conditions will be addressed. This course will help the clinician identify patients with neurodynamic dysfunction who may otherwise be diagnosed with musculoskeletal impairments and orthopaedic pathology. A lab component is included and participants should have lab clothes available.

Pharmacology in Physical Therapy Suzanne Tinsley, PhD, PT, NCS Saturday-Sunday, October 8-9, 2016 10.5 contact hours

Many patients being referred to physical therapy are taking prescription and/or over-the counter medications. Although many of these medications are directly related to their physical therapy diagnosis, some may not be. What should you know about clinical pharmacology to manage them effectively in this readily changing environment of managed health care as a key member of the health care team? We will explore the critical aspects of pharmacology including the principles of pharmacodynamics and pharmocokinetics as well as how to apply these concepts to all drug classifications. We also will discuss specific concepts of the pharmacology of the central nervous system and autonomic nervous system. This course will provide clinicians with information on the effect of drug actions on the major body systems, including mechanisms of therapeutic actions and adverse drug effects, problems involving drug interactions, and variables that modify drug effects. Special consideration will be given to many of the drugs most commonly used in treating cardiovascular and neuro-musculoskeletal disorders. Using case reports, we will discuss specific effects of drug therapy that impacts the physical therapy management and functional outcomes of patients and clients.


